Church News

I can't believe that six months have passed already in my new role as minister here in Langbank and Houston & Killellan Kirk. The work has been varied, and I have seen many different aspects of life in this beautiful part of Scotland.

Church life has changed significantly since a church appeared in Langbank in 1866. It is near impossible to imagine what life would have been like for the people that have gone before us, especially in those earliest days. I often find myself wondering what they would think of what they saw if they walked into the church today. I don't worry about how critical they might be of my own style which will be significantly different, because my style is meant for today. The ministers and the congregation of their day were meant for their time and place. No doubt we would be critical of them if we were able to go back to such times.

I am writing this in the week that I am preparing to dedicate a new church bible. We will be moving away from the days of the Good News translation that had become the main translation for many churches over the last 50 years or so. The new bible is gifted by a church member in memory of her husband and the dedication insert has a bible passage noted.

"You are my refuge and my shield; I have put my hope in your word." (Psalm 119: 114)

The church is not our refuge but rather God is. These words (obviously not originally in English), were written thousands of years ago, very far from the banks of the river Clyde. These words still speak to us though. I don't think the bible is a rule book to follow but rather a way for us to try and understand God as a creator. The words written in the bible should help us with that understanding and when we need it most, we should find comfort in it. Is it that easy? I don't think so.

I believe that if we want to truly feel the comfort and safety of God, we have to use the hope we have from the word of God. To gain a better understanding of God, we need to embrace the words of the bible and develop an understanding that can only come from hearing another perspective or from seeing the love of God being acted out in our communities across the world.

If you are reading this and think you want to try and understand God more, then why not try and do that alongside the good folks that are your neighbours here in the village. If a church service is a step too far, the cakes at the drop in café on a Monday afternoon are excellent and the chat can be good too.


